Director's Reflections: The 2023 Year in Review

You know, having fun is hard work. Twice a year, as prescribed by the Mid-Continent Region (MCoR) by-laws, the Board of Directors (BOD) is required to meet. One meeting is held at the regional convention each summer and the second is usually held in KC in January. We meet in KC because it is geographically about the center of the MCoR area. In case you are not aware, there is a MCoR website http://www.mcor-nmra.org/index.html. Check it if you have not already and learn more about the Region. As a side note, three individuals will be representing the Gateway Division (GWD) at the MCoR BOD meeting: Jeff Cooper, who was just elected Secretary for MCoR, John Garavaglia who is legal counsel for MCoR, and myself as the GWD Director. We conduct the business of the Region as required and part of that business is for the Divisions to provide an update on their activities. I just finished up my annual report for the upcoming MCoR winter meeting.

Reviewing the year and completing my report made me realize that its been a busy hobby year for us in the GWD. And that's a good thing. I think, I hope, we have all had fun. That fun however does require some hard work. For example, we are scheduled to have 12 monthly meetings for the year. Of those, we actually had 7. With three of the 12 being hands on events: decals, wood craftsman structures, and then trees. October was canceled due to most of the officers being sick. And November was the fall meet in lieu of a meeting. Each of the 7 meetings required each officer to prepare their reports for the Division and each meeting requires a presentation. Each meeting also requires the GWD roadies to haul in the AV equipment, set it up, operate it, strike it, and haul it back out. No small task. Each of the hands-on clinics require

planning, securing a venue, procuring of material, notices, set up, clean-up, and a presenter.

We had the first fall meet since 2019. Restarting any annual event after a hiatus is challenging. It is almost like starting from scratch. When? Where? What? And many more basic questions have to be gone through. However, for those who attended the December meeting the report on the event was super exciting. Fall Meet Chairman Walter Beckman, your newly elected Assistant Superintendent, and Dale Dewitt answered the call, answered all the open questions, and pulled together a great event at the VFW hall in Collinsville. Sure, we had a few cobwebs to shake out and we have discussed a few items to tweak for next year. But overall, it was a success. Almost 200 paid attendees, a profit (bigger than our last few in the before times), on site food, and a solid celebration of models event with a number of merit awards issued. Next year Brad Joseph has agreed to take on the Chairmanship. He will be looking for helpers, so don't be shy. It was hard work, but it was fun.

As with the fall meet, our Outside Activates Coordinator, Ron Gawedzinski has begun scheduling prototype tours again. To wit; he set up a tour to Micro Engineering in May prior to their move from Fenton to Mexico, Missouri, a tour of the TRRA Madison Yard and facilities in Venice, Illinois, and a rail excursion event in Southeast Missouri.

Greg Gramlich, our GWD Operations Coordinator also continues to set up pertains sessions. He typically announces event at monthly meetings. Also, the Tuesday night operations group continues to chug along coordinated by Mike Thomas. That being said, Mike is always looking for layouts to operate on and operators to sign up. Anyone interested in either contact Mike or myself.

Once again, this summer we co-sponsored the St Louis RPM meet and provided volunteers to assist on event days. The event is the premier RPM event in the country. It kicks off with the two primer events on Thursday evening with the BBQ gathering at Bandana's adjacent to the Collinsville Convention Center and then the Nightcap at the adjacent Double Tree Hilton. Friday and Saturday offer 38,000 square feet of model railroading largess consisting of more than 3,000 attendee displayed models, 47 premium vendors including major manufacturers, 16 historical societies, 22 clinics, and 6 learning stations all for one reasonable entry fee that is less than smaller RPMs in Chicago IL, San Francisco CA, or Cocoa FL. This year RPM attendance was just shy of 800. Next year the event will be held Friday July 19th and Saturday July 20th. Come, bring your favorite models and immerse yourself in a fantastic model railroading experience.

I also want to assign a few lines to two individuals who must be having fun because they have been working really hard for the rest of us. I want to make sure that everyone is aware of all that Dan Knipp has done for the GWD over the last few years as Assistant Superintendent. Dan has exemplified service to the hobby. Let me give some examples. Once he took office he immediately took on the challenging job of lining up monthly presentations. It's a lot harder than it sounds, and he has done a fantastic job. Dan also spearheaded a review of the bylaws which lead to several updates presented to the membership for ratification. In doing his review he became intimately familiar with the bylaws making him able to advise us on the BOD of our obligations as a board and ensure our conduct has been in keeping with the by-laws approved by the membership. When Rich Velten, long time GWD Treasurer, unexpectedly passed away, Dan stepped in and carried the weight of that office as well for quite a while until a replacement was elected. That was a herculean effort to obtain, review, and sort the existing records without the luxury of a transition period or the ability to question the previous officer to answer any open questions. I think both Willie and Jimmy will tell you that he has been the consummate Assistant Superintendent, always there to pick up the slack, always reliable, and always looking out for the best interest of the GWD. So next time you see Dan, take a minute to thank him for all he has done for the last few years. He is a major reason we all get tired having fun.

Another person I believe needs some additional recognition as we close out the year is Jeff Cooper. Jeff became active in the GWD during COVID with the advent of our virtual connection (fun begets fun), making his home base of Marion IL much closer than it actually is. He has taken over the job of Clerk and Editor of the RPO and become an active member in general. With both jobs, he dove right in and put his own unique mark on them building on the strong foundations laid by others. In addition to being a valuable addition to the GWD, Jeff is now applying his enthusiasm on to the MCoR Region office of Secretary. I think he will be a strong addition to the already competent core of folks working at that level. And it is always better to have GWD represented on the MCoR BOD than not. As with Dan, I think both Willie and Jimmy will tell you that he has been a great addition to the officer's group here at GWD.

Now I'm tired from the hard work of writing about the hard work of having fun. I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season celebrating your appropriate holiday(s) around this time of year.

Achievement Program Update:

What Do You Want To Learn To Do (and how are you going to learn to do it)?

Improving your model railroading skills is all about learning how to do something new. Perhaps you want to learn how to scratch build your first freight car, but where do you start? Or perhaps you want to add an interior to a caboose; you know you will probably need to do some research, but where do you begin? Or maybe you want to learn how to add realistic interiors to basic buildings, but the task seems overwhelming. It's all about learning something new.

Last fall I found myself in such a quandary. I wanted to learn how to apply colored mortar to brick walls for my structures. Not just gray-white on red brick, but brown mortar on yellow bricks. I've tried some of the paste products before, but they washed away on me, so I was missing something. Through trial and error, I got the hang of it, but I know it might have been a few less trials and a few less errors had I just asked someone in the Division for advice..

And I wanted to learn how to carve abutments for bridges. There are quite a few YouTube videos on how to carve blue foam blocks into realistic stone shapes. Military modelers and Fantasy modelers are pretty good at this aspect of modeling, so sometimes it pays to look at work in slightly different domains than trains.

How about you? Have you attended a Make-And-Take session from the Division? Did it get you thinking about your next steps into more sophisticated decals, structures, or trees? Or maybe you are ready to take that first tentative step into operations. If you are finding yourself in that "teachable moment", many area modelers are open to help you get you started,

There is such a thing as "Writer's Block". Maybe you have "Modeler's Block" and don't know what new thing you would like to try, particularly if you are a very experienced modeler. Well, the NMRAx team produces new virtual videos on a monthly basis, so perhaps you might tune in some Saturday and just watch clinics which you might otherwise have no particular interest (or pull past presentations out of the archives). Your imagination just might be piqued to try something totally out of your comfort zone

Some of my favorite resources are the newsletters of other Divisions. During COVID, I presented many virtual clinics for other Divisions, and many of them added me to their newsletter's distribution list. It's always a good day when I get a new copy of "The Pie Card" from the Louisville club or "The Semaphore" from Fox Valley near Chicago. But you don't even need to be on a distribution list to check them out; just visit NMRA.ORG, click on the Regions tab, then on Regions and Division, scroll down past the map and select a Division at random and see what their newsletter is covering at the moment. If something strikes your fancy, well, making a connection with the author is probably just a click away.

The point is, there is always something new to learn, particularly for those of us who are interested in the NMRA Achievement Program, and there are many ways to learn. So until the next RPO, think about what you might want to learn, and what resources you can tap to take that next step. If you need a mentor, drop me a note at ACKMANNS@CHARTER.NET and I'll see if I can make a learning connection for you. Who knows, you might even have an opportunity to share your expertise with someone else. After all, an "expert" is just someone who is one mile ahead of you down the track.

Photo Tour of Steve Goaring's HO Scale Illinois Terminal O'Fallon Branch Layout

Layout Description from the Gateway 2022 National Convention Time Table

Steve Goaring's HO scale layout is modeled on the Illinois Terminal's O'Fallon branch from Troy Jct. near Troy, Illinois south through O'Fallon, Illinois to Peabody Coal Company's St. Ellen Mine in 1960. In his version, the mine gains new customers, finds a new seam of coal, and is prosperous. Besides the IT hauling coal to their river dock in Alton (in staging), the St. Ellen Mine provides coal to Springfield's City Water, Light & Power via the Illinois Central that comes from Springfield, gets on the IT at Mont (in staging), and goes to the mine. The IT also runs a daily Alton Yard & Road job that leaves



Federal Yard in Alton (in staging) and brings cars to the PRR interchange at PAIT and the B&O Interchange at O'Fallon, as well as the local lumber yard. With the purchase of the Peabody Short Line by IC, Peabody has begun hauling coal with former PSL equipment from the St. Ellen Mine to their Mississippi River dock in East St. Louis via IT's McKinley Yard and the TRRA (in staging).

On Saturday, October 21, 2023, a group of 33 members of the Gateway Division of the National Model Railroad Association, the St. Louis Chapter of the National Railroad Historical Society, and guests took a one-day bus trip to Jackson, Missouri, to ride a special charter train on the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway followed by lunch at The Depot Café in Fredericktown, Missouri. The café is located in the restored Iron Mountain/Missouri Pacific depot.

Our train was pulled by an E8 diesel in Pennsylvania RR colors, followed by three coaches and three cabooses. The weather was great. The scenery was neat. The lunch was delicious.

The St. Louis, Iron Mountain, & Southern Railway travels from Jackson, Missouri to Gordonville, Missouri on closed tracks of approximately 5 to 6 miles. Train excursions last approximately 2 hours and the train is run entirely by volunteers. Throughout the year there are many themed excursions including dinosaurs, magic, James Gang robberies, Junior Engineers and Conductors, a Chocolate Express, and a Santa train just to name a few. When weather permits, the excursion will stop at the Iron Mountain Junction Village for campfires, s'mores, games, and music.

Painted On: Modeling Graffiti

Graffiti: the words and drawings in public spaces and on privately owned property that you love to hate, hate to love, simply enjoy or admire or feel completely indifferent towards. Whatever your personal feeling, we aren't here to debate its place in society. The simple fact is that it exists and

some modelers choose to incorporate it while others choose to avoid it. It is your miniature world so you get to decide how you want to follow your passion. This article simply shows you one way of including graffiti on your models if you choose to do so. Love it or hate it, graffiti is a part of contemporary railroading, and modeling it is a personal preference. For me, there is no right or wrong in my book when it comes down to including or excluding graffiti on the layout.

While there are plenty of graffiti decal sets out there that work perfectly fine and look great when properly finished, there are times when painting the graffiti directly on the model has certain advantages. The biggest advantage is that painting your own graffiti allows you to have unique and authentic tags that you are unlikely to see on anyone else's layout.



Step 1: My method to do this starts with LOTS of railfanning to find and photograph ideas from the prototype. Next, sketch out the design on painter's tape with a fine tip permanent marker. Then, using a SHARP hobby knife, carefully cut out the tape for separate sections of the overall tag and the individual letters.



Step 2: I stick the overall outline tape on the car body, and airbrush a base coat of white. Then I stick on the tape to mask off the background of the tag so only the letter area is showing and airbrush my color of choice.




Step 3: Brighter colors are more common. If you want to replicate older faded tags, then spray on a light coat of paint. But for newer tags, make a couple of passes and build the layers up evenly.



Step 4: Pull off the background mask, place the mask on for the letters, then drybrush a background color that has good compliment and contrast to the letter color.







Step 6: Using an ultra fine tip black paint marker, slowly and carefully outline the tag, background, and letters to match prototype tags. I found these particular markers at Hobby Lobby. This step completes the process and you are now ready to put your tagged cars on the rails.

Trees: From Grapevine to West Alton

There are many aspects of National conventions I really enjoy. From getting to tour prototype facilities that I would never have a chance of touring on my own to visiting layouts and marveling at the outstanding work by the owners. I also really enjoy attending the presentations (clinics) so that I can learn something new that I can apply to my modeling repertoire. The 2023 National convention in Grapevine, Texas, the Texas Express, fulfilled all of those aspects I enjoy.

One presentation was about making deciduous trees. I've been to quite a few sessions on making trees and they have been useful, but they just have not been "the one" that I've been looking for. I thought to myself, do I really want to go to another "how to make a tree" clinic. After a moment of pondering, I decided to take a shot as I never know when that one nugget of information will show itself.

In this case, the presentation was given by Mike Ross, MMR. The description of the session was as follows: "Modeling Eastern deciduous forests

is a challenge, especially in the fall with all it's amazina color. For his Virginian Railway, Michael Ross has made literally hundreds of trees. His goal was to mass produce believable deciduous forests trees at a cost not exceeding one dollar per tree. Michael will demonstrate the various techniques he used. A few random attendees will walk away from the clinic with one of Michael's realistic trees." Several words and phrases caught my eye: dollar per tree, mass produce, and various techniques. It was enough to give this "one more tree clinic" a chance.

Mike went through demonstrations on his various techniques and then he finally got to one that was "the one" I had been waiting for. Many (most) of us are familiar with two different products. The first is the brown, plastic, flat molded tree armature that you have to bend the limbs to fill out the tree and then figure out how to either put clump foliage on it to make it look like leaves or figure out how to string around the ground foam netting material that gives it a reasonable tree look.

The other product is Super Trees. This dried plant material has a natural structure that lends itself to look like a full tree with branches. Add paint, adhesive, and leaf material and you have a tree. Well, it isn't that simple. You have to pick off the leaves that grow in the material. For many of the "trees" you have to soak them and straighten them out before you can use them. Even with those additional steps, they still make some good trees albeit with smaller, thinner trunks that do not lend themselves to larger trees.



Mike Ross, MMR gives a live demonstration on his deciduous tree making techniques at the 2023 Texas Express National Convention in Grapevine, Texas Lo and behold, in Mike's session he combined these two products together in a process to make a tree that left me telling myself that "it can't be that easy." Jump forward to September at the Gateway Division Hand-on Workshop on making trees whereby all materials were provided free of charge. As luck would have it, those free materials included both the flat plastic tree armature and Super Trees material. Here is my chance to try out this technique I learned in Grapevine, Texas and even better. I didn't have to "waste" my own money if it didn't work out. Well, let me tell you. It worked out and yes, it is that simple. What follows are my steps in making these trees. I take no credit for these ideas as I learned them from Mike Ross, MMR and the credit belongs to him.



Step 1: Start with the ubiquitous plastic tree armature. I've stared at and fiddled with these things for years trying to figure out how to turn them into decent looking trees.



Step 2: Twist and turn the plastic branches of the armature to give it a fuller, non-flat shape. The plastic is pliable and holds its shape. Once you are satisfied with the overall shape, paint the armature in your choice of color. At the hands-on workshop, we had a can of dark gray spraypaint at our disposal, so that was my "chosen" color.



Step 3: Take the Super Tree material and break it into small pieces. This also assists with getting rid of the large leaves. In the case of Mike, he had a large amount of broken Super Tree material left over from making trees. He used the pieces for these types of trees and also for bushes and undergrowth. Nothing goes to waste.



step 4: Spray the painted armature with cheap hairspray or spray adhesive and dip it into your pile of Super Tree pieces. Roll it around and add additional Super tree pieces and parts until you get the general shape you are looking for. Spray it again with your hairspray or adhesive to set all of the material and let it dry.



Step 5: Spray the entire tree with your choice of color of paint. I used the dark gray and dark brown spraypaint we had on hand at the workshop. Let the paint dry. At this point, you can go on to the next step to add leaves or you can stop here and have a leafless tree to represent a dead tree or one at home in a late fall or winter scene. A little lighter gray color would likely look better.



Step 6: Spray the tree once again with hairspray or spray adhesive and apply your choice of leaf material. You have multitudes of types and colors to choose from. At the hands-on workshop we had ground foam available, so that is what I used on this tree. Mix in different colors to give it an improved look as nothing in nature is just once color. Once you are satisfied with the look, give it one more spray with your hairspray or adhesive and let it dry. You are now ready to plant that tree.

For me, this process seemed to be "just that easy." A bonus was to finally figure out a use for those flat plastic tree armatures. In addition, this entire process took me probably ten minutes or possibly 15 minutes per tree. The longest part of the process was waiting for paint and glue to dry (and getting distracted with good conversations with others at the workshop!)

By attending a national convention, I was able to learn a new technique from a fellow modeler, try it out at a Division event, share this technique with other modelers at the event, and now write an article for the newsletter about it. This tree technique has traveled a lot of miles from Grapevine, Texas to West Alton, Missouri and then on to the pages of this newsletter. Give this technique a try and if you like it, be sure to share it with someone else.

The newsletter covered Division events and activities, plus articles on Hank Kraichely receiving his Lifetime Achievement Award, Free-Mo layouts, an online railroad magazine index, photo tours of Bill Wehmeier's Katy and Hank Kraichely's Burlington layouts, and the usual recurring columns and features.

FEBRUARY

The Division held their first hands-on workshop of the year: "Decals and Their Application." The workshop consisted of an instructional presentation by David Lowell followed by hands-on decal application by all attendees. We reviewed the steps required to provide a properly prepared surface, tips and techniques for the application of decals, as well as the tools and supplies required for decal application. The Division provided all materials at no cost to the participants.

We had Ricky Keil repeat his presentation on Free-Mo due to unexpected technical difficulties encountered by those who joined virtually in January. The second presentation was just as good as the first.

MARCH

Dave Roeder, MMR, of the Gateway Division presented "Planning for Operations" as a follow-up to his October 2022 presentation. This presentation covered planning model railroad operations as well as benchwork, trackwork, paperwork, graphics, crew size, and hosting operations.

APRIL

Bob Miller, of the Gateway Division, presented "Using Animation to Bring your Scenes Alive." Bob discussed how he did the animations on the Jefferson County and Southern MRRC Club layout that was awarded Best of Show at the National Train Show in 2022 and was invited to display at the 2023 NMRA National Convention.

Dan Knipp earned his Achievement Program certificate for Volunteer.

RPO Volume 31, Issue 1 was issued. The newsletter covered Division events and activities, plus articles on operations on Greg Gramlich's Bear Creek layout, modeling C&IM caboose #63, connecting with fellow NMRA members on the new NMRA Interchange, and a photo layout tour of Steve Medler's Wabash layout.

MAY

The Division conducted the second hands-on workshop of 2023. The workshop gave participants a hands-on opportunity to build a laser cut wooden kit. The structure was American Model Builders Lake Junction Station which is based on a St. Louis area prototype. The Division provided the kit and all materials no cost to participants.

A team of 5 judges visited the homes of Greg Gramlich and Glenn Koproske in May to evaluate scenery and structures on their layouts for merit awards. The team of judges consisted of Brad Joseph, MMR, Dave Roeder, MMR, Bob Miller, Willie Richter, and Dave Ackmann.

Greg Gramlich, Operations Chair, hosted an operations session for Division members on his home layout.

A joint group of 17 members and guests from the Gateway Division NMRA and the St. Louis Chapter NRHS toured Micro Engineering Co. (MEC) manufacturing plant in Fenton, Missouri. The tour was organized by the Division's Activities Coordinator, Ron Gawedzinski.

JUNE

Edward M. Koehler of the Sunrise Trail Division presented "Firefighting and Your Model Railroad." This presentation looked at how firefighting is portrayed on model railroad layouts. It started with a historical review of firehouses and then looked briefly at the history of fire trucks. It concluded with some scenes of live fire ground action and a discussion of some points to keep in mind when attempting to model these buildings, vehicles, and incidents.









JULY

Greg Gramlich presented the "Yellowstone Layout Research and Build". The layout was built as a prototypical structure of the Yellowstone National Park - South Entrance in 1925. At that time period a number of different railroads were serving the park with thousands of tourists. There was a lot of research done on the park's attractions, the surrounding town and the terrain surrounding the park. After months of working on the layout it was ready for the NMRA Layout Contest. After the judging, the layout won third place in the scratchbuilt layout category.

Glenn Koproske earned his Achievement Program certificate for scenery.

Jeff Cooper was elected Secretary for the NMRA Mid-Continent region.

RPO Volume 31, Issue 2 was issued. The newsletter covered Division events and activities, plus articles on the tour of Micro Engineering, the Chatham Illinois Railroad Museum, improving and detailing Ma's Place, and photo layout tours of Curt Regensberger's Streator Connection layout and Dick Morgan's freelance craftsman layout along with the usual recurring columns and features.

A joint group of 27 members and guests from the NMRA Gateway Division, the St. Louis Chapter of the National Railroad Historical Society (NRHS), and the Intramotev Company (Intern guests of St Louis Chapter) toured the Terminal Railroad Association's (TRRA) Madison Yard in Venice, Illinois. The tour was organized by the Division's Activities Coordinator, Ron Gawedzinski.

The Division once again supported our long-time cosponsorship of the St. Louis RPM Meet. With attendance of almost 800 and over of 3,000 models on display, it was another great success.

AUGUST

Gary Hoover presented a virtual tour of his new layout. This is his 6th layout and is all new due to moving into a new home in early 2021. The layout is fully operational, the signal system is functional and the scenery is about 75% complete. The layout is prototype/freelance and models the Norfolk and Western in the 1956/1957 era. The "prototype" aspect means that rolling stock, locos, signals and buildings follow the N&W practices. While the geographic location is Virginia/West Virginia, the specific









towns modeled are freelanced. Both steam and first-generation diesels are used. The layout has been designed for both day and night operations with most structures illuminated via LEDs. The majority of the structures are either scratch built or heavily modified kits. The program explained the planning and construction of the new layout along with "railfan" photos taken at each of the completed scenes.

Greg Gramlich, Operations Chair, hosted an operations session for Division members on his home layout.

SEPTEMBER

The Division conducted the third hands-on workshop of 2023. The workshop was on how to make trees. Participants got to try their hand at making trees out of a wide variety of materials and share different techniques with their fellow modelers.

The newsletter covered Division events and activities, plus articles on the tour of TRRA's Madison Yard, the St. Louis RPM, a recap of the September hands-on workshop, and a photo tour of Pete Smith's Loon Lake Railway and Navigation Company layout along with the usual recurring columns and features.

A group of 33 members of the Gateway Division of the National Model Railroad Association, the St. Louis Chapter of the National Railroad Historical Society, and guests took a one-day bus trip to Jackson, Missouri, to ride a special charter train on the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway followed by lunch at The Depot Café in Fredericktown, Missouri. The café is located in the restored Iron Mountain/Missouri Pacific depot. The tour was organized by the Division's Activities Coordinator, Ron Gawedzinski.

NOVEMBER

After a four-year absence due to Covid uncertainties, The Gateway Division of the NMRA held its annual Fall Meet at VFW Post 5691 in Collinsville, Illinois. The Fall Meet featured over thirty vendors, four layouts, 50/50 raffles, prize raffles, attendance prizes, presentations, and two layout tours. The contest room had over 40 entries with room for more. The meet was well attended and plans are in the works for an even better Fall Meet in 2024.

DECEMBER

The Division held its Bring and Brag and Swap Meet in place of a presentation. Members brought projects and collections to display, as well as items to swap and sell.

By acclamation, Walter Beckman became the Division's new Assistant Superintendent and Jeff Cooper received a second term as Clerk with terms beginning January 1, 2024.







Station to Station: Mt. Carmel, Illinois

Station to Station is a regular feature that highlights depots and stations in the Gateway Division whether they still exist or have since faded into history.



This is the former Big Four (Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago & St. Louis) depot in Mt. Carmel, Illinois. Mt. Carmel is located in Wabash County and is 150 miles east-southeast of St. Louis. The line began as the Cairo and Vincennes in 1874. Through bankruptcies and mergers it eventually became part of the Big Four and ultimately the New York Central. This structure once served as Division headquarters. The last passenger train stopped here in 1957. The line survived the NYC/PC/Conrail eras and then the Southern Railway purchased the Mt. Carmel to Cairo segment in 1982. They continued to operate it until the mid to late 1980s.



Structural Elements: Illinois Central Freight House, Herrin, Illinois


The Illinois Central built this brick freight house in Herrin, Illinois sometime between 1913 and 1922. Herrin is located in Williamson County ten miles northwest of Marion and 117 miles southeast of St. Louis. The freight house is at the corner of Cherry and 14th Streets. It is approximately 30-ft in width and 255-ft in length. The structure saw use as a warehouse in its later years. It is currently vacant and has developed structural issues. The building suffered fire damage in April 2021.

The freight house office was located on the west end of the building. According to the Sanborn maps, two tracks serviced the freight house and there was once a dock on the east end of the building.

Herrin is located on what was Illinois Central's Johnston City District. The Crab Orchard and Egyptian took over the Johnston City District after the IC abandoned it in 1987. According to chicagorailfan.com., the last passenger train ran on the Johnston City District in the 1930s.









Sanborn Map Company, January 1913.



The Fall Meet was a success and generated approximately \$2,400 in revenue and approximately \$1,200 in expenses resulting in a profit of about \$1,200. By choosing the VFW in Collinsville, it saved \$500 to \$600 in table rental costs as the VFW provided them at no cost to us. There are a few wrap up expenses that will be paid in December. The previous Fall Meet (2019) generated an approximate \$800 profit as a comparison. Additionally, interest revenue is up in November. The bank account balance stands at \$25,752.67.

<u>Directors and Officers (D&O) Liability Insurance</u>

Mr. Levin discussed the topic of D&O Insurance. This insurance protects the Officers and Directors of the organization in the event someone files a lawsuit. If the insurance is not procured, and someone files a lawsuit, the officers would have pay attorney fees out of their own pocket. In this day and age with the number of frivolous lawsuits, the Officers feel it is important to procure this coverage. Additionally, National NMRA D&O insurance policies do not extend to cover the Divisions like their liability insurance. Mr. Levin obtained 3 bids and the low bid is from The Hartford for approximately \$522 per year. A member asked the policy limits. Mr. Levin reported that the policy limits are \$1,000,000.

The procurement and annual renewal of the D&O policy was approved by unanimous vote.

Elections

Dale DeWitt reviewed the election process for 2023. He reported that the Elections and Nominations Committee consisted of himself, Don Head, and Glenn Koproske. The committee sent out notices to members indicating that there were 2 positions open for nominations: Assistant Superintendent and Clerk. There were 2 to 3 members interested in Assistant Superintendent; however, all but one dropped out. There was one nomination for Clerk. The nominee for Assistant

Superintendent is Walter Beckman and the nominee for Clerk is Jeff Cooper, the current officeholder. Since there is only one nominee for each position, the recommendation to the Board was to approve the nominees by acclamation rather than the formal election process. The Board agreed with the recommendation and are now recommending to the membership that they approve Walter Beckman as Assistant Superintendent and Jeff Cooper for Clerk for the upcoming terms of office.

It was motioned and seconded that the position of Assistant Superintendent be filled for the next term of office by Walter Beckman and the position of Clerk be filled for the next term of office by Jeff Cooper. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

Fall Meet

Walter Beckman reported on the Fall Meet. Mr. Beckman noted that there were a few changes from previous years. The Cub Scouts provided food for both vendors and attendees as part of a fundraiser for them. We did not have as many vendors as we budgeted, but the ones that were there did really well. Mr. Beckman reported that a group of Board members and volunteers met to discuss improvements for 2024. Mr. Ables noted that he and the rest of the Board feel the Fall Meet was a huge success and thanked Walter Beckman and Dale Dewitt, as well as, all of the volunteers for a job well done. Mr. Ables announced that Brad Joseph is the Fall Meet Chair for 2024 and that flyers are already done and ready for distribution. The next Fall Meet will be the first Saturday in November (11/2/2024) at the VFW in Collinsville. A member asked if there were any items in particular that were problematic. Mr. Ables noted that some issues that we will resolve for the next meet include having a backup for the PA system, improving the space for the presentations/hands-on demonstrations, and improving the exterior signage. A member asked if the setup schedule was an issue. Mr. Ables reported that the new setup schedule worked out fine. The layouts were able to be set up the evening before and the vendors were able to set up the morning of the meet. In checking with the vendors, there were no reports of problems with this arrangement.

AP Updates

Dave Ackmann reported that Glenn Koproske's SOQ for Volunteer was misplaced by the Region. Mr. Ackmann resubmitted it and is waiting for it to be processed. This will be certificate #5 for Mr. Koproske. David Lowell inquired on the status of the paperwork from the AP judging at the Fall Meet. Mr. Ackmann reported that he needs to work with Chris Oestreich to finalize everything. A member recommended that the Division streamline the process for the 2024 Fall Meet. Mr. Ables reported that there are improvements planned such as starting the judging earlier and taking care of paperwork ahead of time. He also noted that there were a lot of good entries this year.

Volunteers Needed

Mr. Ables reported that volunteers are needed for Assistant Clerk and Operations Assistant. Greg Gramlich is the Operations Chair and handles operations on the west side of the Division. It would be helpful to have someone volunteer to set up operating sessions on layouts on the Illinois side of the river. If anyone is interested in either position, please reach out to Mr. Ables.

Club Updates

Mr. Koproske reported that the "fun run" at the public libraries have been a huge success and often result in the doubling the number of attendees in comparison to other library events.

RPO

Mr. Cooper reported that the deadline for submissions to the newsletter is January 1st, but that date is flexible if someone has something in the works. Mr. Ables thanked Mr. Cooper for his work on the RPO.

Other Business/Announcements

- Mr. Koproske, Membership Chair, noted that the membership roster has 78 blanks when it comes to birthdate so we cannot get an accurate analysis of the age of our members. He noted the Division had 234 members in January but only 202 by the end of November. Mr. Ables noted that this is due, in large part, to a temporary membership bump caused by the National convention in 2022. This same phenomenon occurred during the last National convention in St. Louis in 2001. Membership numbers typically hover around 200.
- Mr. Koproske remarked that there is no link on the Division website to join the NMRA. Mr. Ables
 reported that the website needs to be updated and he has been in contact with the
 webmaster.
- Dan Knipp, outgoing Assistant Superintendent and Presentations Chair noted that he has the presentation scheduled for January, which will be by Mr. Ackmann giving an 18-month update to his 3D printing process and presentation. Discussion ensued if Mr. Knipp is to continue as the Presentations Chair. Mr. Ables noted that another member has volunteered but has been out of the area for several months and has not been able to take over. Mr. Ables requested that Mr. Knipp continue until the new Chair returns to the area.
- Mr. Lowell reported that Mr. Cooper has been elected Secretary of the Mid-Continent Region
- Mr. Koproske noted that we will have a N scale article appear in the National NMRA magazine, possibly in the February 2024 issue.

Presentation

After a short break, attendees showed off and discussed the models they brought to the "Bring and Brag." Attendees also had an opportunity to buy or trade items at a member swap meet.
