

Coming Up: Continental Fabricators Tour

Arrangements have been made to have a Joint Group Gateway Division NMRA and St. Louis Chapter NRHS tour of:



Continental Fabricators fabricates pressure vessels, towers, drums, etc. They also have **special expertise in fabricating, restoring and rehabbing steam locomotive boilers.** Presently, they are working on new additions to the pressure vessel, a 3-½ course boiler and smoke box of Pennsylvania Railroad's T1 # 5550 4-4-4-4 steam locomotive and also a new boiler for Gulf & Ohio RR No. 112, 2-truck 60-ton Shay built in 1923. In the past, they also completed 3 to 4 miniature boiler repairs for the Wabash, Frisco and Pacific RR, a new boiler for Mid-Continent Railway Museum former Chicago & NorthWestern #1385 4-6-0, restored a boiler for U.S. Sugar Co. 4-6-2 #148, and furnished a boiler course with fluesheet and smokebox for Grapevine Tourist Railroad #1344.

<u>Safety Requirements:</u> This is a tour of a fabrication shop <u>under actual working conditions!</u> <u>Safety is</u> <u>paramount!</u> A safety meeting will be scheduled before tour starts, usually 5-10 minutes prior. Safety requirements are as follows:

- <u>Safety goggles</u> if you have them, bring them; regular eyeglasses <u>with safety lens</u> are acceptable.
- Earplugs are suggested as arc welding and other fabrication machinery can get loud.
- Good pair of walking shoes. Safety shoes are not required. No open-toed shoes.
- The facility is <u>NOT</u> ADA accessible in the shop areas as floor is rough and uneven. Floor is neither wheelchair nor walker friendly.
- <u>General Rules:</u> No high heels, no sandals or flip-flops, no weapons, no strollers, no back packs, duffel bags or cases. Shirts are required. Tour is conducted in a shop environment where dust, dirt and noise will be encountered. Dress appropriately.

We will be breaking into smaller groups and the tours will visit many interesting areas of the site. Photos and videos from a distance will be OK; **HOWEVER**, no close or detailed photos of anything in process (example -- partial welds, pieces not fit-up 100%, etc.)

NOTE: Attendance is limited to 30 people. Tour attendees must drive their cars to the tour site. You should plan on arriving at the Tour Site at least 10 minutes before the tour start time. Tour will start promptly. WE WILL NOT WAIT FOR LATECOMERS. Please Note, the tour is on a weekday, Friday, in the late afternoon so allow time for traffic.

Achievement Program Update: The Delight is in the Details

"The Devil is in the Details" is an old phrase, and model railroaders considering participation in the NMRA Achievement Program know this full well. One of the five main categories in which contest points are awarded is devoted to "Details", and sometimes it is difficult for me to know what super details would be appropriate and where to find them. Maybe the same problem effects you. But rather than viewing detailing as a chore, sometimes details can be a delight.

Many of you know that I write software I call "Generators" to allow me and others to create custom 3D printed models of structure components (the software is available for free at http://daackm.github.io). Although I started out with programs to create walls, windows, roofing, wooden floors, and other large components, I find myself now attracted to creating detail parts. Although not a part of the Generator collection, I



have recently created a bay window, A/C units, ice machines, and exterior gooseneck lamps; tiny things that cost me pennies to print as a 3D model, but would cost a fistful of dollars at a hobby shop, assuming I could even find them.

It didn't take much to create such models using my primary CAD software, TinkerCAD. The ice machine is just a pair of squashed cubes for the body and the compressor at the top. A triangular prism "hole" gave the main body chamber a slant, and two more rectangles created the lid and handle. Just 5 pieces. A bit of paint for the lid, a custom decal for the brand name and I was done. The gooseneck lamp is just a pair of cones for the shade (one for the physical part and another as a "hole" to recess the interior), plus three 90° "torus" parts for the support bends, some cylinders, a bit of paint, and voilà, done! I couldn't find any such non-operational gooseneck lamps on the Walther's web site, but now I have a stock for life.

The A/C units are just a stack of cones, chopped off at the top with a cube "hole" (as a novice 3D modeler, I tended to think mainly in terms of adding solid pieces, but "holes" in CAD can be your best friend). The bay window is just some rectangles with mitered edges then joined together before printing, and I didn't even need a drop of glue!

I've started a spreadsheet containing a list of other detail objects I want to create. Corner and street-side mailboxes are obvious choices, and planter boxes for flowers are also on the list; a newspaper rack, too. Stacked logs, a fire pit and a BBQ grill made the cut as well. I am sure there are many more, if I just keep my eyes open to the details in life.

If you have any details you have added to your models which you would like to share (3D printed or not), let me know. Details can be a delight.

A Very Special Congratulations to our friends <u>Greg Gramlich</u> and <u>David Lowell</u> on meeting the qualifications to receive their Master Model Railroader awards #773 and #775, respectively. If you have attended any of Greg's operating sessions, you will agree that details are everywhere, and a true delight to anyone's eyes. Greg and David will receive their plaques at the November banquet. Thanks, Greg and David, for letting me be a part of your AP journey.

Photo Tour of Lonnie Bathurst's Litchfield Train Group Layout


Layout Description from the Gateway 2022 National Convention Time Table and by Richard Schumacher on the Gateway Division Website. Photos by Jeff Cooper



The Litchfield Train Group's 55'x44' HO scale layout depicts the ever-gentle rolling countryside of Illinois from Centralia to Chicago. The scenery of the main room is set in the 50s/60s-era when steam engines were becoming extinct and diesel locomotives were gaining in popularity. The main room is completely sceniced with typical midwestern scenery with coal, grain, and freight car switching in five different areas along the mainline. The smaller room represents 70s-era Chicago and provides additional industry destinations including an old meatpacking plant and large gravel mining operation. Operators can stage up to 14 16-foot trains in the Chicago yard. The layout is capable of three teams of two operators on the mainline, while five other teams of two operators handle switching assignments.






























































Joint Tour of Intramotev

On Thursday, August 22, 2024, a joint group of rail fans from the Gateway Division NMRA and the St. Louis Chapter of the National Railroad Historical Society (NRHS) toured Intramotev Inc. Ken Vaughan of Intramotev acted as our tour guide and gave us an extensive tour of the site, providing excellent explanations of their operations each step of the way. Due to confidentiality issues, tour attendees were not allowed to take photos or video; however, Intramotev allowed Ron Gawedzinski to take photos. Company officials reviewed and approved the photos included with this article.

Intramotev is a startup company developing autonomous, battery-electric, self-propelled freight cars. It targets carload freight by retrofitting conventional equipment with autonomous, battery-electric propulsion systems that also can be operated by remote control, a railcar with the heart of a locomotive.

Intramotev has two primary products, TugVolt and ReVolt. TugVolt can provide three modes of operation. First, it can run in a train just like any other freight car. Second is point-to-point operation that combines conventional operation for the long-haul and autonomous or remote-control operation for short-haul regional and local delivery. Third is using it like an autonomous or remote-control locomotive in local service. ReVolt can recapture waste energy in traditional trains via regenerative braking and reduce locomotive diesel fuel consumption.

Ron Gawedzinski, Outside Activities Coordinator, Gateway Division NMRA and St. Louis Chapter NRHS arranged the tour.



The St. Louis RPM Continues to Grow

The 2024 St. Louis Railroad Prototype Modelers Meet came and went at the Gateway Center in Collinsville, Illinois on July 19th and 20th. The STLRPM is the largest annual RPM event in the U.S, and this year it did not disappoint. Attendance increased to an all time record of 950 attendees. They were treated to thousands of models, dozens of vendors, a multitude of clinics and presentations, multiple on-site layouts, and home layout tours and operating sessions.

Even with the record setting attendance, "success" is kind of defined like "beauty." It's in the eyes of the beholder. The question of how many attended and how much the STLRPM has grown is always a fun topic as we have grown so much in the past decade alone. And while growth in attendance is a fair question or topic, given the obvious growth at the STLRPM that has taken place and during a time that some other rail hobby related events in other parts of the country have lost attendance, we never define our success by its size.

The success of any RPM is at least partially measured by a post-conference review where attendees talk about he fun they had in seeing something new, meeting someone they were glad to meet, saw some models they learned from or simply enjoyed studying, gathered information they wanted, interacting with exhibitors, and, of course, buying something unique if they wanted to. At the end of the meet, we hope that they felt like the time, money, and effort they invested was not only worth it, but that they will come back with their friends.







Our goal is to try to attract the modeler who wants to grow in the prototype part of the hobby. If the RPM attracts them because of some aspect of the prototype world that did not appear prevalent at some rail event they had experienced before, great! That is what we want to have at the RPM for them. From the models that roll down the track, to structures on the sidelines, to vehicles and/or other detail parts, to a vast display of all aspects of the history that modelers seek out, we feel that success could, at least partially, be defined as being able to offer what the attendees want to find at our RPM event.

Our "not-so-secret-sauce" is to try to balance the focus on the models, clinic number and content (and learning stations), the kind, quality, and number of exhibitors, as well as, the time the exhibitors are available to meet with attendees, the variety of historical societies attending, along with some social events. The meet location, time of year, event facilities, favorable lodging is critical and works in favor of the overall success of the RPM. The home layout tours, operating sessions, and high quality operating layout(s) on the floor adds to the enticement. Once we have as many of those pieces in place that we struggle with and engage in planning for during the other 51 weeks of the year between our RPM events, we can take a deep breath and say "it's about the models."

The STLRPM is already on the books for 2025. Starting on Thursday, July 24th, there will be evening layout tours and then the two-day main event at the Gateway Convention Center in Collinsville, Illinois starts on Friday, July 25th and continues on Saturday, July 26th. Stay tuned for exact times and details regarding all the events surrounding next year's STLRPM. We are looking forward to another great year and we hope to see you there!

Station to Station: Ullin, Illinois

Station to Station is a regular feature that highlights depots and stations in the Gateway Division whether they still exist or have since faded into history.

1997

The Illinois Central depot in Ullin, Illinois, built in 1897, has made a couple of trips of its own over its lifetime. The current depot is the third depot built in Ullin. The first two were built in 1854 and 1863, both of which were later demolished. The current depot served passenger traffic until 1967.

The 24-ft x 60-ft depot is wooden frame construction and is typical of structures built in that era. It is believed the depot was built with hardwood timber from local sawmills. The sill and girders that form the base frame are 10" x 10" creosote timbers, the floor joists are 3" x 10" placed on 18" centers, the wall studs are full 2" x 4" placed on 24" centers, and the trusses are 2" x 6" placed on 24" centers. The roof planking is 1" thick lumber.

The depot was segmented to have the passenger waiting area on the south side, the station master and ticket office in the middle, and a large freight area on the north end. Changes to the depot over the years, other than it moving twice, primarily consist of changes in the siding and roofing. The depot's siding changed from vertical to horizontal wood siding. Sometime around 1947, the siding changed again to a combination of wood and Transite siding. The changes included horizontal wood siding from the foundation to the bottom of the windows and then Transite from the bottom of the windows up to the eaves. The color scheme was gray on the horizontal wood siding, door and window trim, doors, soffits, and eaves. The Transite was and offwhite creating a two-tone paint scheme. It appears that the structure had a slate roof

based on reports filed in 1898 and 1915, but it was changed to three-tab asphalt shingles as some point.

The interior has 1" x 6" pine flooring over what is thought to be 1" maple subflooring and the walls and ceiling in the passenger and station agent areas are sheathed with 1" x 3" car siding with 1/4" bead on 1 1/2" center. There is picture molding around all the walls at the 12-ft mark and the ceilings are 14-ft. There is crown molding where the walls meet the ceiling. The brick chimney is wood covered with exposed cleanout and stovepipe holes. The freight room has an open ceiling and boards sheath the walls up to the nine foot mark leaving the rest of the height of the wall unsheathed. The flooring in the freight room is solid 2" thick planks.

In 1972, the Illinois Central was preparing to abandon the building when it was sold to Phoenix Mill. The mill moved the structure across the tracks and located it approximately 300-ft northwest of its original location but still on property the mill leased from the railroad. The mill did not alter the structure and used it to store supplies. Fire destroyed the Phoenix Mill on Labor Day in 1979 but the old depot only received minor fire damage on an eave. The mill rebuilt in a new location and left the old depot behind as the cost to move it to the new location was too great. The old depot sat unused for the next 18 years.

In 1997, the Illinois Central notified the village of Ullin of its intent to demolish the old depot. As the land lease with the mill expired, the railroad declared the depot abandoned and readied it for demolition. A group of Ullin Civic Club members worked with the Ullin Village Board to save the depot within days of its scheduled demolition, but it had to be moved. In a gesture of goodwill, the Illinois Central sold the village the plot of land that was the original location of the depot. On





December 2, 1997, the old depot moved once again. The same company that moved the depot in 1972 moved it back across the tracks to where it originally stood. It was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1999. Eventually the village renovated the depot and it became the village hall and library in 2012. The application to the National Register contains additional information regarding the exterior and interior doors and windows that would be helpful to the modeler.

Structural Elements: Grange Hall, Murphysboro, Illinois

Structural Elements is a regular feature where we will examine both rail and non-rail structures and scenes to bring attention to the details that you can incorporate into your models and layout. Mundane details tend to be overlooked as our eyes are looking for the unusual or interesting. Through this feature, we want to highlight the ordinary and often overlooked details.

This small, unassuming brick building is located alongside Illinois Route 13 in Somerset Township north of Murphysboro, Illinois. While scarcely used today, the building has served as a backdrop for many people in the area. It is a Grange Hall, which is a meeting house of the National Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry (or the Grange for short).

Built in 1912, is was the second building constructed by Somerset Grange Hall #1553. The first Grange Hall of frame construction was built in 1876 and burned down in 1909. After the fire, the one acre property reverted back to the original owner of the property. In 1910, a committee assembled to find a suitable location for a new, fire-proof Grange Hall. The committee selected the site of the previous hall and then purchased the tract for \$350 payable over a 9 year period.





On May 27, 1911, the committee received bids to construct the new 24-ft by 40-ft brick structure and awarded the contract to W.A. Pittman for a cost of \$1,355.65. At the April 1912 meeting, the building committee reported the total final cost of the building was \$1,401.15.

The hall itself is Early Commercial architecture and is constructed of soft red brick three layers deep with a below grade concrete foundation. The hip roof is covered with slate. There is an arched crown design above each door and window. The windows are 1/1 double sashed with a concrete or stone sill. The windows are covered with 4-ft x 8-ft steel shutters bolted to the brick walls. The only known alternation to the exterior of the building is the installation of a door on the east side of the building. The door took place of the southernmost window.

On the inside, the walls are plaster with tongue and groove wainscoting extending up three foot from the floor with a 4-inch wide decorative wooden border capping it off. The original ceiling was decorative metal and measured at 12-ft above the floor. The floor is finished concrete poured in sections. There are two iron railings installed on the north end of the building to divide the hall into two sections. When

meetings were held, officials sat behind a heavy oak table located behind the rails during the meetings. The attendees sat on church style wooden pews. The building was completely restored in 1988 by tuckpointing the brick, reglazing and painting the windows, installing new restrooms, replacing the wiring and fixtures, and repairing the floors.

The hall served as a center of many local activities such as Grange, Farm Bureau, Masonic, and township meetings, induction center for World War I draftees, election polling station, summer Bible school, suppers, school plays, 4 -H club activities, ice cream socials, ball games, and family reunions. The hall was the only public meeting space in the entire township. It is said that at one time, anyone who grew up in Somerset township likely had memories of important events that took place at the hall.

Grange Hall is listed in the 1974 Illinois Historic Survey. The renovation earned it a Certificate of Achievement by Governor Thompson in 1989. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1990.

The Illinois Central railroad ran along one side of the property and at one time there were scales for farmers to weigh grain and livestock before shipping to market. There was also a flag stop station for

passengers and also for farmers shipping milk, cream, and veal calves to St. Louis. The Illinois Central eventually abandoned the tracks and then removed them in 1970.

The national Grange formed in 1867 after the Civil War and is the oldest American agricultural advocacy group with a national scope. The goals of the Grange were to educate farmers, improve their social lives, and support their economic needs. The Grange also opposed monopolies that set prices for grain and livestock, and protested high railroad freight rates. By the 1880's, membership was close to 800,000. Over the years, membership declined and by 2005 there were 160,000 members in 36 states. In 2022, the Grange experienced a net increase in membership and as of 2024, the Grange continues to press for the causes of farmers with a mission statement that reads: "strengthening individuals, families, and communities through service, education, nonpartisan grassroots advocacy, and agricultural awareness."

Modeling Considerations

This structure would be a straight forward scratchbuilding project. It also lends itself to be built full size without compression as its footprint would be approximately 3 3/8" x 5 1/2" in HO Scale and 1 13/16" x 3" in N Scale. The 1/1 windows

Would not be difficult to model, either with commercial parts or scratchbuilt. The steel shutters could be modeled with styrene and could be in the open or closed position. It would not be too difficult to make the shutters positionable if you so desire. This little structure would add character to a remote rural scene or near a flag stop or remote grain elevator. It would also lend itself to be modeled in almost any era. Fortunately, with the history of the building preserved in the National Historic Places application, you have a good idea how to detail the interior of the building if you so choose.


